Marie Curie (1867-1934) was a famous Polish scientist. She studied at Sorbonne University in Paris, (1)in 1893 she gained a degree in physics. A year later she gained a degree in maths. In 1894 she met Pierre Curie. They got married in 1895. (2)Meanwhile a German named Wilhelm Röntgen discovered X-rays. Then in 1896 Antoine Henri Becquerel discovered that uranium gives off mysterious, invisible rays. In 1897 Marie Curie started investigating uranium. In 1898 she coined the term 'radioactive' to describe any substance that gave off the mysterious rays. Marie also examined a substance called 'pitchblende', which she realized must contain some elements that are much more radioactive than pure uranium. In 1898 Marie and her husband Pierre isolated an element they called 'polonium' (after Poland), (3)However , they realized there was another element in pitchblende.
